Section 2: What Council proposal is being assessed?

To develop a dynamic Health Protection response for Wirral, evolving from the Local Outbreak Hub model, established in response to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. Wirral's existing Local Outbreak Hub is funded until 30th September 2022, by the Contain Outbreak Management Fund (COMF). The COMF grant will continue to fund the newly revised Health Protection Delivery Service for six months, from October 2022 until March 2023, when this funding stream is due to conclude. The core Public Health Grant will be used to fund the Service for twelve months from April 2023 to March 2024, to ensure local resilience and continuity. The service will be evaluated throughout this period, to inform planning.

The Health Protection Board will regularly review, monitor planned programme of work delivered by the Health Protection Service specifically linked to our Public Health priorities.

A dedicated Quality Assurance function within the Health Protection Service will actively monitor service delivery and evaluate outcomes to capture lessons learned, and consider any equality impact.

Time constraints from the perspective of needing to mobilise the service quickly to utilise the funding within the designated time frame have also placed some limitations on this process of consultation.

Consultation will continue over the coming months, to inform and support the continuing development of this service over the coming 2 years.

The Council has and continues to engage with a range of partners and communities to understand local needs and gather insight in relation to local health protection requirements. The existing workforce has undertaken formal consultation regarding the new proposed service, as existing fixed term contracts are due to conclude in September 2022.
