

Disability: Asthma sufferers,	Mixed impact on those suffering from substantial Asthma. There will be a positive impact arising from the decrease in use of fossil fuel burning mowing machines, and in the long term from increase tree growth leading to increased air quality on average, however this will be balanced in some situations with increased levels of pollen from unmown grass. (It is important to note, the initial research carried out by PollerGEN regarding cutting and pollen does state that it requires further research to analyse the impact it may have on health". There are a confounding number of issues to consider (e.g. amount of exposure, location etc) so imagine it would be difficult to quantify.)	Promote nearby parks as alternatives. On Wirral's website we will advise residents that there is a reduced grass cutting regime in place and that there may be higher levels of pollen during certain periods of the year and that they should check the pollen count and plan their visit accordingly. Note: Mowing of sightlines for safety purposes are not proposed to be part of this saving option, but instead will continue to be mown.	Mary Worrall	Ongoing	Significant Officer engagement time

Disability: Blind and Partially sighted	Negative impact in that longer vegetation and piles of vegetation where cutting takes place on a less frequent cycle, will hide potential hazards (e.g. dog faeces, trip hazards), especially to those in this group	Promote nearby parks as alternatives. The Management Team will carefully plan the reduced and ceased maintenance with a view to limiting the impact on the Community as far as is reasonably practicable within the restrictions of the significantly reduced budget and resources. The Plans will be implemented with Members and the Community as the limited resources allow.
