The nature of the development is such that it does not overtly discriminate against any of the protected groups listed in Section 4 and there will be no residual negative impacts once it has been delivered.

The high ropes element is inherently positive, bringing new opportunities to engage with nature, be physically active, and socialise. There are examples where such sites include elements that facilitate a wide range of abilities which will be explored during the procurement process. The scheme will be sustainable and provide net benefits to the environment increasing biodiversity.

The additional car parking capacity will increase opportunity for residents and visitors of the borough to enjoy the park, increasing accessibility. The design and spec will be fully considerate of all abilities and this will be built in (e.g. ensuring allocated parking near to facilities reducing distance, and providing suitable pathways (e.g. slope, width, surface cover)). The provision would particularly cater for anticipated and pent-up demand for local open green space post-COVID. This has been balanced against climate change needs, with aspiration to install safe bike storage and improve pedestrian access (the scope of which will depend in investment requirements), although local public transport and access provision will impact this.

A dog wash carries a small footprint and will serve a key user of the park. It is anticipated the key users will be regular dog walkers using it once or twice a week and ad-hoc users as and when the need arises (e.g., excess mud). It is not anticipated that this would impact any protected group.
